Since then, I have been serving as the Secretary of the Section. In Spring 2021, we launched a successful online seminar series, where both leading experts and upcoming researchers have had the opportunity to present their latest findings in front of a diverse audience whose members hail from all over the world. For example, we could provide opportunities to present their work at the annual ISF and at specialized workshops. Additionally, we could organize short courses specifically tailored to their needs on trending topics which are usually not part of the curriculum.
